From the Pastor's Desk

Dear People of God,

As I think about January 2023, one of the first things that occurs to me is that it will mark the completion of my third year as priest-in-charge at St. Peter's. Time sure does fly! I can't but look back for a moment and think about the challenges we've met, the changes we've made, and the blessings we've received together. There'll be a fuller "State of the Parish" statement at our Annual Meeting on January 22nd (mark those calendars!), but for now, please just know I remain daily grateful to be so blessed as to serve you as your priest. Thank you, and thanks be to God!



Of course, and more importantly, January also takes us into the season of Epiphany. Keeping with my opening tone of reminiscence, I want to reiterate a few things I wrote in last January's *Rock*. The season of Epiphany is about the revelation to the world of the divinity of Jesus Christ, "Emmanuel," "God *with* us." And the first Sunday after the Epiphany is the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord, an event I have always found deeply moving. There's something about Jesus, the Son of God, the Savior of the world, getting in line with all the sinners and getting baptized just like them that's truly touching. It shows in its own way what the Birth of Christ shows, what Jesus dining with the tax collectors shows, what the Crucifixion shows. Jesus is determined to be right there alongside each of us, and among all of us, no matter the circumstances, every step of the way. He never stands apart.

That's a profound lesson for the Church. *No one* is made to stand apart, and no one can

afford to stand apart. To put it in clichéd terms, we're all in this together (*whatever* "this" happens to be!). With all that in mind, let me remind you of a major Epiphany event this year: Please mark your calendars and make every effort to participate in our next adult education offering at St. Peter's, coming up on Saturday, January 14th.

We'll be holding a one-day mini-retreat as part of our living out the "Pledge of Faith and Action Against Racial Injustice," which we made in response to the work of our diocese's Commission to Dismantle and Racism and Discrimination. It will be co-led by our deacons, Tom Tripp and Diana Leiker, our parish liaison to the Commission, Sue Gunn, and myself. Our time together will include prayer, scripture readings, other short readings, conversation, and sharing, with a focus on learning more about *implicit biases*—what they are, how we all have them, how they relate to systemic and structural racism, and what we can do to understand and overcome them for the sake of the Gospel.


It remind us of the Outline of the Faith found in our *Book of Common Prayer* (p. 855), which spells out that "the mission of the Church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ," that the Church pursues this mission as it... "promotes justice, peace, and love," and that the Church carries out this mission "through the *ministry of all its members*." The journey to become the Beloved Community begins with courage, honesty, and the truth being spoken in love. This mini-retreat will be a crucial step in this journey, and after three years with you I know you, the people of St. Peter's, have been gifted

with the kind of courage, honesty, and love needed for it.

We'll gather at St. Peter's from 10:00-2:30 on Saturday, January 14th (lunch provided). Appropriately, that's on Martin Luther King weekend. May our time and work together during this retreat open our eyes, especially if we believe ours do not need to be opened.

MLK weekend 2020, by the way, was my first Sunday at St. Peter's. I look forward to beginning my fourth year at St. Peter's on the heels of this very important gathering. May the Light of Christ illuminate your heart and light your way throughout this Epiphany season.

It reminds me that there is always light after the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it.

I also am in shock, like the rest of the country, waiting to hear about the health status of Damar Hamlin. While not being an avid follower of sports, I still find myself praying for the life and recovery of this young man who literally put his life on the line when he walked out onto the field to play the game he loves and entertain the people who love football. I have to say that I am so proud of the way the NFL postponed the game, putting the players and coaches mental and emotional status above money. I worried that they would tell the players to get tough and go out there to win. It struck me that while we complain about sports being one of the many false Gods of many Americans, keeping them from church and church activities, when push came to shove, it was a child of God that we put above everything else. Money did not talk in this

Refugee Update

As of this writing, all of the Christmas gifts for our refugee families have been delivered in time for their celebrations.

Lois and I delivered the Moises family gifts on the Thursday before the blizzard, by necessity. The only ones present were mother Deborah and eldest son Mikaele. We gave them strict instructions to open only on Christmas Eve or Christmas itself, and take pictures to send to us.

I also checked in with them after the blizzard, and found that everything was good, and everyone was safe. They never lost power or heat, and had enough food stored up to sustain them throughout.

Since the Balanovych family is Ukrainian Orthodox (Christian), they celebrate Christmas on New Years Day, and/or Epiphany (Jan. 6). I delivered their presents on New Year's Eve to a bunch of smiling faces.

Their apartment had lost power prior or during the storm, and somehow the family found their way to safety at Katryna's house, the sister of Serheii, the father. Katryna, if you remember, was the saintly sponsor for the family's exodus to America. Power is restored, and they too are doing well, all things considered.

One bit of good news is that both Serhii and mother Halnyna now have their work authorization papers, which now permits them to seek gainful employment. We will begin English mentoring sessions very soon.

I pray that 2023 will bring more blessings to each family as they continue assimilation into American society.

It will help us share the amount of items we donate and better anticipate shopping needs. All of us know the cost of toiletry items, spaghetti, peanut butter, tuna, chicken, soups, etc.; many of our neighbors cannot make their food supplies or Pet food last until their next visit to a food pantry, or supermarket.

Thank you for whatever help you can provide. We are asking for volunteers to help fill the box once or twice per month. No shopping is required. If you are interested, please call or email Gary or me.

Linen Pantry Update

In December we served 17 clients from 8 agencies. Because of the storm we were even closed for several days.

The middle of December we filled and delivered 4 dozen Christmas mugs to each of the 3 food pantries. I made deliveries to 2 of the pantries. They were each, very happy to receive our donations. They look forward to giving their clients a little something extra at this time of year. If you have Christmas mugs you don't want, we can use them for next year. We purchase some mugs at after Christmas sales and from donations.

Along with the Christmas mugs, the 3 food pantries each received two large trash bags filled with hats mittens, scarves and socks. These too were also greatly appreciated by the pantries on behalf of their clients.

A thank you goes to Sharon and Mike Taube for donating 6 dozen Christmas cups filled with candy. Another thank you goes out to Carolyn Bong's Needle Group for providing a lot of the hats, and scarves. We could not do what we do without the help of others.

I took 21 coats and jackets donated during the year to Calvin Cleaners for their "Coats for Kids" project. They will be repaired (if needed), cleaned and distribute to those in need. I was told me they can use adult size coats to give to teenagers and adults who need something warm to wear this winter.

We still need hats, mittens, scarves and socks for distribution to the 3 food pantries sometime in February.
