### From the Priest's Desk

Dear People of God,



You've probably heard the phrase, "C and E Christians." It refers to Christians who only go to church on Christmas and Easter. It's pretty much always used negatively indeed, judgmentally. And to be honest, I don't much like it.

For one thing, some of the finest people I've ever known were "C and E Christians" (and some weren't Christians at all, but that's another column). So why disparage them? Moreover, those of us who attend Sunday worship more regularly might wonder, if some people only feel drawn to worship twice a year, is worship *failing* to meet their spiritual needs, and if so, how, and what can we do about it? Maybe we need to get the log out of our own eye before getting too focused on the speck in our neighbor's (Matthew 7:3).

Mostly, however, I don't like "C and E Christians" because it's one more phrase that serves only to separate the Body of Christ, to break us down into subsets and hierarchies when the reality is each and every baptized person is equal to every other (Galatians 3:28: "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus"), and each and every baptized person is "marked as Christ's own forever" (*Book of Common Prayer*, p. 308).

The fact is, in a different sense, we're all "C and E Christians," no matter how frequently we go to church. None of us would have any connection to St. Peter's, however often we come to church, were it not that we each hold deep in our hearts the knowledge that there really is Love to be found in this world, the ultimate source of that Love is the One we call God, and God's love for us is so great He became human to show us just that. We wouldn't be Christian if we didn't have a personal experience of the reality of Christmas.

And none of us would have any connection to St. Peter's, however often we go to church, were it not that we each hold deep in our hearts the knowledge that there really is Love to be found in this world, that the ultimate source of that Love is the One we call God, and God's love for us is so great that He suffered death to show us Resurrection is reality, and so there is hope for us all. We wouldn't be Christian if we didn't have a personal experience of the reality of Easter.

In other words, God's great acts of love on "C" and "E" are what make "Christians" possible.

I write this greatly anticipating our celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus the Messiah on Easter Sunday, April 9, and giving thanks for *everyone* who is reading this message. May you find yourself experiencing the loving presence of God throughout the coming Easter season, and indeed this very day. Fr. Dan+

As you read this, we will be in the middle of Holy



Week, with all its symbolism unfolding to reveal the last week of our Saviors life, death and resurrection. Since Christmas, we have moved from Jesus' birth, to meeting His cousin, John, as he announced Jesus' coming and Baptized Him, and on to the calling

of the disciples to leave their lives behind and follow their Rabbi. We have witnessed miracles and healing Jesus performed to glorify God, have heard thought provoking parables and references to the Hebrew Scriptures challenging the status quo and the hypocrisy of the high priests, and now we are walking with Jesus as the scriptures are fulfilled through His death, with all its pain and sorrow, and into the mystery of resurrection.

For me, some years are easier than others to stay focused during this week when I feel the intensity of the pain, suffering, and humiliation our Lord endured. Sometimes I just can't bear to hear the story one more time because I want Christ to be alive, alive in me, me in Him, and the fear of my own death overwhelms.

There have been years when I was just a bystander watching the story unfold from a distance, maybe to protect myself from my own pain, my own sin, or maybe my curiosity was stronger than my commitment. And, there have been times when I was fully immersed in the week and emerged from the darkness of my own tomb as a butterfly, singing praises to God for all that had been done for me and in me.

I believe that we enter into Holy Week from different places that reflect where we are on our spiritual journey. It is equally important to ask "why", why we are on the outside looking in, or why we are able or not able to open our hearts to suffering this time.

This year, more than ever, I am looking forwards to singing "alleluia" once again and leaning into the knowledge that we are resurrection people who are strong enough to take the troubles and pain in the world, the country, and even the changing Church, in stride, without fear, knowing the triune God is with us and all we are really asked to do is spread the light of love to all people.

Speaking of bringing love to all people... Thank you to all of you that bought tickets for the quilt raffle that is supporting the work of Episcopal Relief and Development in Ukraine. We sold \$100 worth of tickets that will be added to what St. James sold to parishioners and the public that came through to pick up their Lenten fish fries. Your generosity is appreciated.

Count on some Summer Fun.....

Summer seems like a long way off, but mark your calendars for a day retreat in East Otto on August 12. It may be hot, but my daughter assures me the bugs won't be as bad as they are in July. Heat....bugs.....I chose heat.

Missy Lopat will once again work for the outside team, and Deacon Tom will again serve on the inside team, for the 3-day event between April 28-30.



The St. Peter's congregation members have been generous supporters of this

ministry for many years, in which we bring the Good News of Jesus Christ through the barbed wire and into the hearts of those who have strayed from God in one way or another. You can help once again by filling the following needs as a support parish:

 Baking cookies and/or muffins that we bring in each morning to start the days off right with some home cooking. The only no-no's are jimmies, sprinkles, or icing on the cookies, and poppy seeds in the muffins. Package them in dozens if you can. Pray for both the inside and outside teams during that time, as well as for the minds of the inmates to be opened to our presence and our mission.

. Write an encouraging card, note, or letter to an inmate. Do not seal any letters or cards, and do not sign your name or leave an address or phone number. You should address it "Dear brother" as we will not know yet who will attend; and you can sign similarly and anonymously *"your friend*" or "*A Christian brother/sister*"

Outside participation by parishes go a long way to making these retreats a success. One of the key points is to show those inside that Christians can *"love thy neighbor*"- even one in prison. I will need any and all of your donated items by the Wednesday of that week, which is April 26. You may bring them into church that week, or my house. I will pick them up from you if needed.
