#### From the Pastor's Desk

Dear People of God,

I sure hope this column doesn't make me sound like Scrooge!

Perhaps you've heard there's a "war on Christmas." It's hard to know when it "started," but if you watch certain television stations or listen to certain commentators, it has been "happening" for a long time, and it "gets worse every year," and it's right about this time of the year we see its "effects." And one of the most "troubling" pieces of "evidence" of this "war on Christmas," you will likely hear, is how nowadays people not only say, but are "expected" if not "forced" to say, "Happy Holidays" instead of saying "Merry Christmas." GASP!

As most of those quotation marks in the previous paragraph imply, I don't think there's a war on Christmas at all. At least not in the way we usually hear that phrase. And, for what it's worth, I happily say "Happy Holidays" to people when I don't know and am not so inconsiderate as to make assumptions about their personal religious beliefs. That said, you won't hear me say "Happy Holidays" to you. I know you celebrate Christmas because you believe that that holiday—that holy-day—is the Feast of the Incarnation, the celebration of the Son of God choosing to "share our human nature" and "live and die as one of us" in order to "reconcile us" to God (BCP p. 362). To me, wishing a "Merry Christmas" to someone who isn't Christian makes no more sense than someone encouraging me to enjoy Eid al-Fitr, the Islamic holy day that marks the end of Ramadan. I respect that holiday. I don't

celebrate it. Why would I wish a "Merry Christmas" to a non-Christian?

On the other hand, maybe there is a "war on Christmas" after all—although I am now going to stop using that offensive phrase, with its cheap, scare-tactic metaphor that only serves to diminish the horrors of real wars, the kind that kill people and destroy homes and create misery, and don't just get certain self-serving pundits and politicians peeved. Let me call it instead the "secularization of Christmas" (which, I admit, doesn't quite roll off the tongue the same way). It dates back at least until 1870, when Christmas went from being "just" a religious holiday to a federal one. It certainly intensified over the course of the following century, as what was supposed to be a profound religious celebration became increasingly commercialized. It continues today in the insistence that we should say "Merry Christmas" to anyone and everyone, draining the phrase of meaning. As the Christmas carols started to play from the overhead speakers in the department stores a little earlier every year, and "Black Friday" (not to mention "Cyber Monday") came to stand on seemingly equal footing with other national "holidays," we were taught in countless subtle and not-so-subtle ways that the "true meaning" of Christmas was to be found not so much in how little the Christ-child had but in how much we have, not so much in what the Christ-child offers, but in what we think we want and need.

Actively resist, fight back against, that secularization of Christmas. It surrounds us, and it can seep into our psyches without us even realizing it. Start that resistance by



allowing Advent to be Advent, a distinct and beautiful season of the Church year when we don't bathe in Christmas lights but prepare for the coming of the

Light. Then celebrate Christmas not for what our culture tells us it's "supposed to be," but for what it is: a 12-day festive season when we revel in the gift *God* has given *us* in Jesus Christ. Be mindful and intentional in remembering that when we're giving gifts or visiting family or going to a Christmas Eve service, Christmas is really about our encounter with the *Holy* in those experiences. We are entering deeply *sacred* seasons. Embrace them as such.

You remain in my prayers. I pray you will experience a holy Advent and a joyful Christmas, and I give God constant thanks for the gifts you are.

## End of the year approaching

2023 is drawing to a close and December is always the busiest month of the year. The Vestry is working hard on the 2024 budget and looking forward to next year's activities. I would like to thank everyone for maintaining their 2023 pledge donations and timely response to the Stewardship drive by returning their 2024 pledge cards. This information will be used to finalizing the 2024 budget.

Every year we seem to have a major project to maintain and improve St. Peter's physical plant. In 2020 the roof over the Sacristy was replaced. In 2022 the roof on the Mission House was replaced and the fire alarm system was upgraded. In 2023 the roof drain over the sacristy was replaced and the sound system and camera where upgraded. Some of this was partially supported by grants from the Diocese and the balance from your continued support. We will be exploring the possible replacement of the heating boiler. While this system is still functioning, it was installed in the mid 60's and

we believe it is better to be proactive on this as to opposed to waiting for a failure.

Again, thank you for your continued support and we are looking forward to another great year in 2024.
