From the Pastor's Desk

Dear People of God,



We celebrate Creation Season in October, so, of course, both Creation (capital "C," "All that is, seen and unseen," as the Creed puts it) and creation

(God's activity, and ours, of making new things, and making things new) are very much on my mind. So, this month I offer you two short poems about creation. ("Poem" and "poetry," by the way, both come from the Greek word poiesis, which means "create" or "make.") One is very old, the other very new, from the opposite ends of the history of poetry in English.

The first is known as "Caedmon's Hymn." It was composed by a humble man named Caedmon in the 7th century, in Old English, the earliest form of the English language, very different from English today. (The first line in the original reads "Nu sculon herian heofonrices weard"; if you look closely, you can see the word "heaven" hidden in the fourth word of the line.) It is the oldest poem we have in English, and it is written to celebrate God and Creation. Here's my lame, but fairly literal, translation:

Now let us praise the guardian of Heaven's kingdom, the power of the Maker and his mind's thoughts, the works of the Glorious Father. He, the eternal Lord, established a beginning for every wonderful thing. First the holy Creator shaped for humanity Heaven as a roof. Then our guardian, the eternal, almighty Lord, made the earth for us.

I love Caedmon's hymn for its artistry, for its antiquity, and for the simple fact that the first poem ever composed in English honors God,

Creation, and our place in it. The kinship of all that is.

I love, too the writings of Steven Charleston, Choctaw elder and former Episcopal bishop of Alaska, and he has gifted us with a new book: *Spirit Wheel: Meditations from an Indigenous Elder* (Broadleaf Books, 2023). From that book, published over 1300 years after "Caedmon's Hymn" was composed, is his poem, "In the Midst of Creation's Wheel":

It was not my hand

That sketched the deep valleys of the earth Or shaped the jagged edges

Of the great mountain's summit.

I did not cast the embers of stars against the night sky

Or pour the waters of the sea onto the dry land.

There is a mind far greater than mine at work A will and a purpose exceeding what I could even dream.

When life seems out of control, I go outside To remind myself of that fact.

I stand in the midst of creation's wheel

And watch in wonder the quiet majesty of its turning.

We are in the care of a love without limit or definition

Under the protection of a love that never looks away.

Creation season ought to remind us that we, and everything we see around us—sun and rain, moon and stars, plants and animals, family and friends—all "stand in the midst of creation's wheel," "under the protection of a love that never looks away." And it should remind us, too, that, like Caedmon, like Steven Charleston, we all have our creative gifts and our creative roles to play, our contributions to make to the ongoing gift of Creation itself. As the Celtic teacher and mystic John O'Donohue writes, "Each of us is an artist of our own day."

May you find yourself more deeply connected to Creation and creation this month, and thereby more deeply connected to God.

For those who didn't know, I was a science teacher in my former life. I trust whole-heartedly in the validity of the

for all the toxins in the earth's soil, waters, and atmosphere. There is a mankind reason behind the increased forest fires, massive droughts, destructive mega-storms, and rising sea levels in the world. There is a mankind reason for the increased endangered and extinct species of this planet.

God wants us to be caretakers of His Creation, not the destroyers of it.

Look for and vote for GREEN INITIATIVES at the polling places, and vote for candidates that support them.

God is there to give us hope. God needs us to give him/her hope for Creation.

Episcopal Relief & Development

We know that Episcopal Relief and Development responds to natural and

environmental disasters across the globe. And, the fires on Maui and heat related problems experienced this summer are no different. But here are some things you may not know.

The administrative and staffing costs for ER&D are paid by the operating budget of the Episcopal Church and are not deducted from the donations. Over 90% of the donations are channeled to the relief and development work. The rest are for printing and other expenses related to their work around the world.


Relief and Development agencies from different denominations have differing specialties and work together in crises. Methodists, for example, specialize in being first on the ground after a disaster. ER&D works with those who are first on the ground, to provide needed food and supplies. But ER&D's specialty is to provide ongoing, long-term assistance.

One example of that is the challenges two years after Hurricane Ida (which hit the metro area of New Orleans in 2021) included inadequate housing and limited access to health care. Those ineligible for Federal aid are most vulnerable. ER&D partnered with the Diocese of Louisiana for a second year of long-term recovery aid. Another is their work with our churches in Europe assisting Ukrainian refugee. If you want to help people over the long term – whether in response to fire, flood or other disaster, a gift to Episcopal Relief and Development is a wise investment
