From the Pastor's Desk

Dear People of God,

We used to have a dog named Penelope. Before she became our dog, she belonged to a friend who one year asked us to watch her over the holidays. Penelope was our houseguest that year between Christmas and New Year's Day. At that time, we didn't have a dog of our own, but she made it easy on us. She was always there, but never made noise and didn't make a mess. She was always happy to see us, no matter our mood. We fed her and made a little spot for her, sure, but we didn't really have to change our lives or schedules for her at all. Penelope was easy to find—we didn't look for her, she came to us and easy to accommodate—she happily played by our rules.

In other words, she was just the sort we Christians often have in mind, sadly, when we say we want to "grow the church."

I suppose you could say we behaved like "good Christians" because we welcomed Penelope into our home. But maybe Penelope was more "Christian," because she was the one willing to leave her "comfort zone" to enter ours. She was the one willing, as the saying goes, to meet us where we are. Yet how often do we say that to others, literally or metaphorically: meet us where we are?

Whenever we do, we should remember that's precisely how God does NOT work. God finds us. We see it during both Christmas and Epiphany. God finds ways to meet us where we are. As John's Gospel tells us, "The Word became flesh and *dwelt among us*." That's what the Nativity of the Savior is all about—God coming to us.

But maybe no event illustrates this more powerfully than the Epiphany story of Jesus's Baptism. John the Baptist went out preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. John's warning was that the Messiah's "winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear the threshing floor and to gather the wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn in unquenchable fire." People from all over heard that message and came to the Jordan River to be baptized. They lined up, people like you and me. And what does Jesus do? Well (and I've always wondered how John the Baptist reacted to this) he doesn't stand over them with a winnowing fork. The Messiah gets in line with the sinners. He makes himself present to them. Jesus gets in line and gets in the water with everyone tired of the selfishness of this world and of their own role in it, and—even though he himself has no sin—he is baptized. John talks of wheat and chaff, but Jesus's own message is even greater. We can never buy into reductive dualities like wheat and chaff, good guys and bad guys, us and them, once Jesus says by his actions "I am with all of you, and you all are one with me."

As we at St. Peter's head into 2024, may we do so renewing our own Baptismal Covenant "to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves." That means a willingness to get out of our comfort zones, to meet people where they are, so that as we seek out Christ manifest in all persons, they may see him manifest in us.

Challenges for St. Peter's 2024 Budget

As the former Treasurer and now a member of the Vestry, I was surprised to learn at our December Vestry meeting that we expect to propose a deficit budget for 2024. If we are to propose a balanced budget in the coming year, we will need additional money. The Diocese expects churches to have a balanced budget whenever possible, and the Vestry wants to present to the congregation such a budget at January's Annual Meeting.

Our current deficient is approximately \$12,000. Certain items such as salaries, utilities, insurances and pensions are almost impossible to reduce. Other items can be cut, but we would prefer not to if possible. The vestry has found a few areas to cut back, but basically right now we are looking at either (a) increasing pledges wherever possible, (b) having some kind of fundraiser(s), or (c) beginning to draw down reserves.

I got a small raise in my Social Security. The more I thought about it, I decided I can afford to increase my pledge. I called Ed Hill and asked him to increase my pledge. (Sorry it wasn't the \$12,000). Look at your budget and prayerfully see if you too can donate a few extra dollars per week or month. If so, just let our Treasurer Ed Hill know.

The vestry will be meeting again on January 9th to try to balance the budget and will present the best budget we can at our January 28th Annual Meeting.
